REFLECTION/DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- Consider your own views on the death penalty. Do you agree or disagree with the Catholic Church's teaching that the death penalty is "inadmissible"?
- How does the death penalty violate the Church's teaching about upholding the inherent dignity of the human person?
- What does the word "justice" mean to you?
- Consider what kind of services a state could provide if it did not spend money on the death penalty.

ACTIVITIES/ASSIGNMENTS

- Write a letter to the editor about the death penalty.
- Watch the film 'Just Mercy' and use CMN's Just Mercy Catholic Study Guide (catholicsmobilizing.org/just-mercy-guide) for a guided discussion.
- Research whether your elected state officials have spoken about the death penalty and write them a letter explaining your own stance.
- Research and summarize in either a paper or a presentation your state's history and use of the death penalty.
- Look up whether any bishops in your state have made statements about the death penalty. If yes, write them a letter thanking them for their leadership on this issue. If no, write them a letter inviting them to be more public in their support for ending the death penalty and share with them what you have learned.
- Short essay: Does/How does you your faith inform your opinion on the death penalty?

*Large group, small group, pair share, journaling, or follow-up assingment

SUGGESTED SEQUENCE -HIGH SCHOOL

- 1. **Pre-Reading:** "Catholic Social Teaching and the Death Penalty" handout and History of the Death Penalty Timeline
- 2. Video: Catholics and the Death Penalty
 - a. Church teaching on justice: Right Relationship
- 3. **Invite a speaker or watch a film** (Alternatively, have students watch film on their own before class)
 - a. Activity (if watching a film): Discuss film as a class—What feelings came up during the film for you? What was something you learned? Something that surprised you?
- 4. **Reflection (either in pair share, journal, or small group):** Consider your own views on the death penalty. Do you agree or disagree with the Church's teaching that the death penalty is "inadmissible"?

5. Assignment:

- a. Research and summarize in either a paper or a presentation your own state's history and use of the death penalty.
- b. Look up whether any bishops in your state have made statements about the death penalty. If yes, write them a letter thanking them for their leadership on the issue. If no, write them a letter inviting them to be more public in their support for ending the death penalty and share with them what you have learned about the death penalty.

- 1. Pre-Reading or Pre-Viewing: 'Just Mercy'
- 2. **Supplemental Readings:** "Catholic Social Teaching and the Death Penalty" handout, History of the Death Penalty Timeline, Interactive Map of Past Executions in the United States, Executions by Race and Race of Victim
- 3. **Activity:** Use CMN's 'Just Mercy' Catholic Study Guide (catholicsmobilizing.org/just-mercy-guide) for a guided class discussion
- 4. **Assignment:** Research and summarize in either a paper or a presentation your own state's history and use of the death penalty.
